VOTING LEAVE ON ELECTION DAY

As the 2008 election season enters its final stretch, employers must be aware that various states afford employees time off to vote. Although Michigan has not yet enacted such legislation, more than 30 states across the country have enacted voting leave laws.

While voting leave laws share the common goal of ensuring that citizens are able to exercise their right to vote on Election Day, the specific requirements vary widely depending on the jurisdiction. For instance, states vary regarding the amount of leave an employee must be given, whether time off must be paid, whether employees must give advance notice of the need for leave, and whether employers must post notices regarding employees' leave rights. In certain states, employees may not be entitled to voting leave if the polls are open for a specified period of time outside of an employee's scheduled work hours. Some states even impose criminal penalties upon employers that violate voting leave laws.
