The next questions involve the climate for entrepreneurs in Michigan.

Since its inception during the Eisenhower administration in 1953, the Small Business Administration has provided individuals with free training, loan guarantees and other forms of assistance in order to help them launch a business enterprise. On the state and local level, there are similar governmental agencies such as the Michigan Economic Development Authority and regional development authorities that offer publicly funded assistance aimed at helping people start and maintain commercial undertakings.

Supporters of the Federal, State and local business assistance agencies argue that small business enterprises – generally defined as those with less than \$7.5 million in annual receipts for non-manufacturing entities – form the backbone of the state's economy and it is in everyone's best long-term economic interest to encourage and assist individual entrepreneurs who are willing to take the risk of launching a business.

Opponents of government agencies using tax-funds to directly benefit individual entrepreneurs maintain that the cost to the public greatly outweighs any net economic benefits such assistance might have somewhere down the road. Opponents also say it's not the proper role of government to involve itself in what is supposed to be a free marketplace.
