Researchers intended this clinical effectiveness study to provide evidence to support, contradict or modify established standard management techniques for these babies. Major questions have since been raised about the ethics of the study: whether par- ents enrolling their children were adequately informed of the risks, whether the study involved experimental treatment at all, and more broadly how to conduct clinical effectiveness research in the future. Supporters say that without studies like SUPPORT, we will never know if "standard" care actually helps or harms patients; critics say that SUPPORT and trials like it create unacceptable risks and lack full disclosure. | | |
| | | This session will begin with a review of the factual, legal, regulatory and ethical issues raised by SUPPORT and other clinical effectiveness research. Then a distinguished panel, representing all sides of the debate, will discuss the issues and how teaching hospitals, academic medical centers and investigators should think about them. C. Age-Based Policies for Physician Faculty—Legal and Practical Challenges

The literature and public scrutiny of the issue of advancing clinician age and its impact on clinical performance has forced medical centers to examine their policies and approaches to detecting and addressing cognitive and physiologic decline. This effort has brought the hospital industry face to face with the complex web of federal and state laws and regulations which require oversight of quality of care and patient safety, yet prohibit age and disability discrimination. This issue is even more complicated for Academic Medical Centers due to the rules regarding tenured faculty. This presentation will examine

With the migration to electronic health records, the health care industry is about to jump head-first into the "Big Data" pool. Big Data attempts to extract new insights and create new forms of value by analyzing large data sets to find actionable correlations. Big Data's focus on correlations, not causality established by hypothesis driven clinical trials, can be difficult for physicians and others trained in the biomedical model where the focus is finding the cause of disease in order to treat it. But Big Data has the potential to improve health services research and the public health, shorten the drug development pipeline by reforming how we
